

with people who are moving up in their learning curve can be another positive influence in the learning process for both parties. You can take turns checking your casts and sharing what you've learned. This collaboration can be online and in person.

Visual verification is one of the most important tools in learning to cast well. Seeing what's going on will help identify faults and flaws. Ask someone with experience to observe your casts, or video record your self and analyze the footage. If an instructor or experienced friend spots a fault, have them record it on video for you to see. Faults are more easily believed and understood if seen by the caster, than described by someone else.

Someone who knows what to look for can examine video at a later time or shared online, if they are not present when you're casting. With today's technology, you can even upload your video and share the link with a coach three thousand miles away and they can add analysis for you to see.
